# GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. **\*\*NEW Entries must be received by noon on Thursday, June 20, 2024, unless otherwise stated. Entries received after this deadline will be charged double.**
2. Everyone will be required to wear an "Admission Bracelet". One free weekend gate pass per animal will be given to livestock exhibitors, to a maximum of 6 passes. Regular gate passes will apply after the registration deadline above.
3. All exhibitors must pay a \$10.00 Exhibitor Fee when making entries except if entries are only for Mini classes (30,31,32,49,54,72,76) An exhibitor fee must be paid (excluding Minis) to receive exhibitor prize.
4. All entry forms must be accompanied by cash, cheque or e-transfer for the full amount of entry fees, exhibitor fees and stalls. Cheque to be made payable to the Dauphin Agricultural Society. If you would like to pay by e-transfer please send it to e-mail [dauphinagsociety@hotmail.ca](mailto:dauphinagsociety@hotmail.ca) and the security question answer will be **dauphin** and please put exhibitor name in memo.
5. If entries are in by noon on Monday, June 10, exhibitors will be entered to win their entry fee back to a maximum of \$100.
6. In the absence of competition in any section, or if the stock exhibited shall be of inferior quality, the judges shall award only such premiums as they think the article or stock merits.
7. Stock must be the bona fide property of the exhibitor or his authorized agent.
8. Exhibits that have been erroneously entered, may at the discretion of the judges or director in charge, be transferred to the proper classes, prior to the judging. If such classes have been judged, they shall not be re-judged, and there will be no refund of entry fees.
9. Horses competing in heavy horse classes are not eligible to compete in light horse classes & vice versa.
10. All animals entered in the Light Horse Show must be on the grounds at the disposal of the managing committees by **NOON OF EACH DAY AND MAY LEAVE ONLY AFTER 8:00 pm ON FRIDAY & SATURDAY. \*\*THERE WILL BE NO LOADING OF LIVESTOCK OR TRAILER MOVEMENT UNTIL 7:00 pm ON SUNDAY, June 30<sup>th</sup>. \*\* EXHIBITORS MUST LEAVE BY DESIGNATED GATE ONLY. VIOLATION OF THESE RULES MAY RESULT IN FORFEITURES OF PRIZE MONEY AND POSSIBLE FINES.** Exhibitors may bring livestock the day before the fair. **THESE RULES WILL BE STRICTLY ENFORCED.**
11. There will be no straw or hay provided on the grounds except if pre-ordered. All stalls must be cleaned by 8:00 am each day so that the refuse can be removed before arrival of visitors and must be kept clean. **STALLS MUST BE CLEANED OUT BEFORE LEAVING OR \$20 PER STALL WILL BE DEDUCTED FROM YOUR PRIZE MONEY.**
12. Only animals officially entered will be provided with barn accommodations. Accommodations will be allotted as entries are received. A fee of \$15.00 will be charged for all single stalls, \$30.00 for all box stalls and pens. Box stalls allocated for mare & colts as first priority and then in a first come first served basis. Any exception to be at approval of Horse Committees. Tack stalls available if room permits.
13. No person will be allowed to interfere with the Judges at any time. Should any exhibitor so interfere he or she will forfeit all claims to any premiums to which he or she might otherwise be entitled. Judges' decision is final.
14. Should any fraud, deception, or dishonest practice be discovered on the part of any exhibitor or his agent, the Board of Directors may withhold any prize awarded, and may prohibit any exhibitor for exhibiting for such time as the Board may determine, and may publish the name of such exhibitor should they deem it proper to do so.
15. Any exhibitor lodging a protest must make such protest in writing and deliver to the Secretary on the day the protested award is made, accompanied by a deposit of \$5.00. Should the protest be successful the \$5.00 will be returned.
16. A fee of \$50.00 will be charged to exhibitors who require electrical outlets for campers and \$30 for unserviced sites on the fairgrounds during the fair. Electrical sites are limited and will be assigned on a first come first serve basis when registering. Exhibitors must provide description, length, etc of their unit on their entry form. Exhibitors can find out their camper stall # by inquiring at the barns or there will be signs posted in barns. **HORSES WILL NOT BE ALLOWED IN CAMPGROUND AREA NO EXCEPTIONS**
17. No visitors to the Fair Grounds of the Society nor any person or persons, firm or corporation, of theirs or its agents, representatives, servants and or employees, having holdings or enjoying any license or privilege to exhibit at any time on the fair grounds of the Society, or occupying any space therein for exhibition or any other purposes shall have any claim or right to claim for damages arising from or as a result of any injury or injuries to any person or persons or to any property while on the Fair Grounds of the Society, nor

- shall any claim or demand in respect thereof, ever be made, nor shall any suit against the Society in respect thereof be instituted or maintained.
18. If any damage, loss of injury to person or property shall be caused by reason of neglect or wilful act of any person, firm or corporation, or their agents, representatives, servants or employees, having license or privilege to exhibit on said Fair Grounds or occupying any space therein the Dauphin Agricultural Society shall in no manner be responsible therefore, and in case it be subjected to any expense or liability, all persons causing or liable thereof shall indemnify the said Society. No stalls shall be taken without authorization of the Directors in charge.
  19. All foals to be on halters at all times-in ring and around Fair Grounds.
  20. Entry Fee is \$4.00 per class unless otherwise stated. Stake Classes \$15 Entry Fee. **NOTE**—GST is included in all fees. Entry Form attached.
  21. **A minimum of three entries required for a class to run**, except Mini.
  22. **No post entries or changes to entries allowed at ringside.**
  23. The MGRA Western Division of the 2024 Horse Show will be governed by the Manitoba Gymkhana and Rodeo Assoc. Rules. For the rest of the classes, if a rule is not specified in the fair book, then they will be governed by CEF Rules.
  24. **AGE DIVISIONS** - all ages are as of January 1 of the current year  
Mini : 8 & Under (no cross entry with PeeWee classes in the same event)  
PeeWee: 12 years and under  
Junior: 13 - 18 years  
Senior: 19 years and older
  25. 4-H members will be judged in the age categories above. Prizes will be awarded based on a point system. Participants must be **current** 4H members and may be asked to produce their 4H card. Please indicate on registration if you are a current 4-H member.
  26. **HEIGHT DIVISIONS** PONY : Under 14.2 Hands LIGHTHORSE: 14.2 Hands and Over
  27. Maximum tack change time 5 minutes.
  28. Patterns will be posted 1 hour prior to classes.
  29. Proper attire must be worn in the show ring and horses properly groomed. This would include Hat, Riding Boots and Long Sleeve Shirt with Sleeves Rolled down.
  30. If an exhibitor has two horses in any class, both horses should be saddled and ready to go or arrangements made with a director to have their entries spread out.
  31. The Show Committee reserves the right to test for any medication, drug or mechanical device administered internally or externally to a horse before or during an event and upon discovery of such, have the right to disqualify that horse from competition.
  32. The judge or ring steward may send any horses from the ring for bad manners or lameness.
  33. Exhibitors should be familiar with the MGRA rules.
  34. Exhibitors should at all times co-operate with the fair officials in parking of trucks and trailers, parking wagons and buggies and in keeping their stalls in an orderly and tidy condition.
  35. Exhibitors are asked to refrain at all times from foul and abusive language in and around the stables and in the show ring.
  36. Horses entered in classes where height is specified may be measured in shoes in which they are to appear in the ring by committee appointed by the Society.
  37. Stallions may compete in all classes except where specified. Stallions two years old and over may not be shown by a junior.
  38. One line class per horse (no registered classes anymore).
  39. Exhibitors must ensure they wear the corresponding number issued for their entry. Each horse and rider combination will be issued one number.
  40. On making entry, the owner assumes all liability on account of accidents to either horse or rider or property and releases the Dauphin Agricultural Society from all responsibility.
  41. NO entry fees will be refunded except for illness as verified by doctor or vet.
  42. All dogs must be on a leash at all times while on the fairgrounds.
  43. In case of rain out, all entry fees of rained out classes will be refunded.
  44. **Ribbon Recycling Program** If you would like to recycle your ribbons the Dauphin Ag society will pay you the following: Flat ribbons - \$0.25 each, Rosette - \$2.00 each. All ribbons must be in excellent condition. Please take to them to the office and the money will be added to your prize money.
  45. No cross entries of horses between all line classes.
  46. **MGRA Sanctioned & NAERIC approved.**

### Exhibitor Gate

The Exhibitor Gate is located off 3<sup>rd</sup> ST S.E. Please turn east, off main street at Kentucky Fried Chicken at the lights. Signs will be posted!! The old gate on 1<sup>st</sup> Ave will be closed to vehicle traffic.

### Reminder

Horse trailers must be parked where designated.

**NO HORSE TRAILERS (unless they have living quarters)**

**WILL BE ALLOWED TO PARK IN CAMPGROUNDS.**

**NO HORSES TO BE TIED IN CAMPGROUND.**

Exhibitors will be allowed to unload vehicles by barns but then are required to park all vehicles in the assigned parking area. Each Exhibitor will be allocated one vehicle pass.

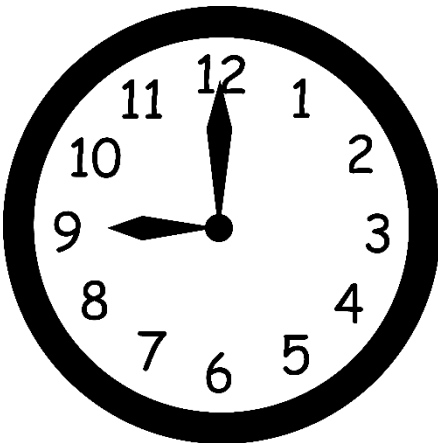

## High Point

Points are assigned to placings in the high point classes for Senior, Junior, and Peewee. At the conclusion of the show the high point winners in the age divisions will receive a prize. High point classes are English Pleasure, English Equitation, Showmanship, Western Pleasure, Western Horsemanship, Reining, Pole Bending, Barrel Racing, Ranch Pleasure, Ranch Riding, Key Hole, and Stake Race.

1<sup>st</sup> 10 points - 2<sup>nd</sup> 7 points – 3<sup>rd</sup> 5 points – 4<sup>th</sup> 3 points – 5<sup>th</sup> 1 point

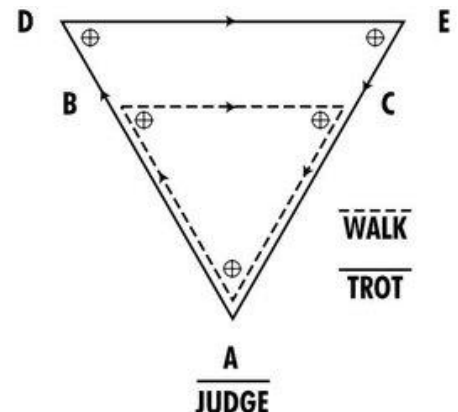
## Class Descriptions

### Walk Trot Division

- These Classes are showing classes that are only at the walk and jog/trot and will not call for lope/canter. Riders and horses can be any age. Division classes are
  - 7 English Pleasure, 12 English Equitation, 14 Hunter Cross Rails, 38 Western Pleasure, 42 Western Horsemanship
- The entry in this division can be for the horse or for the rider.
  - If the rider is entering in walk-trot then the rider cannot enter any other equivalent classes. However their horse could be in equivalent classes under another rider
  - If the horse is entering in walk-trot the horse cannot enter any other equivalent classes. However the rider could be in an equivalent class with another horse
- If entering walk-trot the allowed other riding classes are
  - Hunter and Hair, Family Riding Class, Pole Bending, Barrel racing, Open Timed Obstacle Challenge, Costume Classes, Key Hole, Stake Race, Flag Race, Egg and Spoon, Run-lead-ride, Sack Race, Musical Chairs, Ribbon Race
- In Western walk trot classes any age of horse can be ridden with two hands and is not required to neck rein

### English Classes

Hunter in Hand - The horse is initially judged in the "open" position, which means all four legs are view able when set up for inspection. Horse are asked to first perform a ground covering walk around the smaller triangle, once complete they swiftly, without hesitation move into an open trot that showcases their movement. horses are expected to move around the triangle with ease, comfort, and a quiet relaxed & natural headset suitable for their body type.



English Pleasure - Contestants compete simultaneously, around the perimeter of the arena. The judge evaluates an English type horse on the flat, at a walk, trot and canter. Emphasis is placed on smoothness of gait, free-flowing stride and willingness to perform.

English Equitation - Tests a rider's ability to ride – not the performance of the horse. As in horsemanship, contestants work a predetermined pattern consisting of various maneuvers. Emphasis is placed on ability to sit correctly, hold the correct riding posture and control the horse on a precise pattern. Each exhibitor can only enter one horse in the class.

Dressage - In Dressage competitions, horse and rider perform a series of memorized predetermined movements, known as 'figures' or "movements" in an arena. The test (pattern) will be posted in advance.

Hunter Course - Demonstrates the gracefulness of the horse as it maneuvers a course of fences. Manners, style of jumping, flow of strides, balance and keeping an even hunter pace are factors in the judges' scoring.

Jumping Course - Scores are based on time and penalty faults. Faults are assessed when a horse refuses to jump, knocks down an obstacle, or causes an obstacle to be knocked down. Horses completing the course without faults return to compete in a timed "jump-off" to determine final placings.

Hunter and Hair – A fun class where a person, runner and horse get a combined speed time over three jumps.

## **Western Classes**

Halter - Evaluates conformation of the horse divided by age, gender, and size. Horses are traveled before the judge so that lameness and quality of movement can be evaluated. Horses are judged on balance, structural correctness, breed and sex characteristics and degree of muscling.

Showmanship - Judges the showmanship skills of the exhibitors. The judge evaluates the grooming and fitting of the horse, and expertise of the exhibitor in presenting the horse. Each exhibitor is required to perform a pattern designed by the judge with emphasis on preciseness of pattern and degree of confidence exhibited by the showman. Each exhibitor can only enter one horse in the class.

Lead Line – For young riders to have a chance in the arena. All riders in the arena at once on the rail. They are to be lead during the class. They will stay at a walk and may be asked for a halt, reverse and back. Each exhibitor can only enter one horse in the class. Riders in lead line cannot cross enter 32 Mini walk trot, or any other walk trot classes. They may enter 46 Pole Bending, 51 Barrel Racing, 68 Key Hole, and 72 Stake Race.

Mini Walk Trot – Run like a western pleasure class but only asked for the walk and trot. Each exhibitor can only enter one horse in the class. Riders cannot cross enter any Peewee classes. They can enter other Mini events and walk trot classes.

Western Pleasure – MGRA - Contestants compete simultaneously, traveling the perimeter of the arena, and at the discretion of the judge, are asked to walk, jog, lope and reverse the direction of the horse. Horses are evaluated on quality of movement while staying quiet and calm, traveling on a loose rein.

Horsemanship - Designed to test the horsemanship ability of the rider. Riders first follow a prescribed pattern of maneuvers at a walk, trot or lope. Finalists may ride as a group around the perimeter of the arena. Judging focuses on the rider's body position, seat in the saddle and ability to control the horse. Each exhibitor can only enter one horse in the class.

Trail - The trail class tests the maneuverability of the horse through an obstacle course. Mandatory obstacles include one in which the rider will open, pass through and close a gate. Scoring is based on the horse's willingness, ease and grace in negotiating the course. The other two mandatory obstacles are riding over at least four logs or poles and one backing obstacle.

Reining – MGRA - Judges the horse on movements, mastery of a prescribed maneuver and attitude as he is guided through the pattern. The horse is required to perform a number of stops, spins, rollbacks, lead changes and circles at a lope. The horse should be willing to be guided with little or no resistance.

Pole Bending – MGRA - A timed event in which the speed and agility of the horse are tested as horse and rider twice weave through a course of six poles spaced 21 feet apart, twice circling end poles before turning and racing to the finish line. The pattern must be followed exactly. A five-second penalty is added for each pole knocked down.

Barrel Racing – MRGA - An exciting race against the clock in which exhibitors follow a course consisting of three barrels in a triangular “cloverleaf” pattern. Riders choose to circle either the right or left barrel first, race to the opposite barrel and complete the course after circling the third barrel and racing down the center of the three barrels to stop the timer. Knocking over a barrel carries a five-second penalty.

Western Pleasure, Barrel Racing, Pole Bending Stake – Class is open to all ages. It is a \$15 entry fee that is put into a pot. The prize money is given out by percentage. 1<sup>st</sup> 40%, 2<sup>nd</sup> 30%, 3<sup>rd</sup> 15%, 4<sup>th</sup> 10%, 5<sup>th</sup> 5%

Western Pleasure Jr Horse – This is run and judged as a western pleasure class including loping with all horses being 5 and under. Riders can be any age.

Western Pleasure Sr Horse – This is run and judged as a western pleasure class with all horses being 6 and older. Riders can be any age.

Jack Benny Western Pleasure 50+ - This is run and judged like a western pleasure class including loping. Riders are to be 50 years old or older

Ranch Pleasure – Run like a western pleasure class. The ranch horse should simulate a horse riding outside the confines of an arena and reflect the versatility, attitude and movement of a working horse. The class is judged on the horse's ability to work at a forward, working speed at the walk, jog, and lope. In the ranch classes tack is working tack without excessive silver and clothing is plain.

Ranch Riding – The class is judged on the horse's ability to work at a forward, working speed while performing a pattern of the required and optional maneuvers. The required maneuvers are the walk, jog and lope (both directions), the extended trot and extended lope at least one direction as well as stops, back and one change of direction. The optional maneuvers are sidepass; turns of 360 degrees or more; change of lead (simple or flying); walk, jog or lope over poles or other reasonable maneuvers a ranch horse could perform. Judges are looking for a relaxed, responsive horse with soft and cadenced gaits. The horse should make timely transitions in a smooth and correct manner, plus the horse should be soft in the bridle and yield to contact.

Open Timed Obstacle Challenge – This is a fun class where riders have two minutes to complete as many obstacles as possible! This class can be ridden two handed and by age of rider.

#### Costume Class

- Comical – costumes of characters or humorous themes
- Fancy – decorative, elegant, or parade glamor

Matched Pairs – A pair of two riders complete a class like western pleasure. The judge is looking for the pair who is the most in time with each other, and way of moving. Extra score may be given for matching outfit and tack. Enter under one number, the class will only be run once so only one entry per exhibitor.

Key Hole – A timed race into a 20ft circle of flour, with a 4ft wide 10ft entrance. If the horse steps on the flour it is a no time

Stake Race – A timed race in figure 8 pattern. Poles are 80ft apart, knocking over a pole carries a five-second penalty.

Flag Race – A timed race to switch two flags that are in pails of sand on top of a barrel. A dropped flag or knocked barrel is a no time.

Egg and Spoon – Each rider is given a spoon and an egg. When the judge says begin riders will balance the egg on the spoon with the thumb on the handle. No fingers under the spoon or gum put on the spoon. The class is run like a western pleasure class will all riders at once and on the rail. When riders drop their egg they go to the middle. The winner is the rider who keeps their egg on the spoon the longest. The judge may move down riders down placings if they do not complete the maneuver called for.

Run-lead-ride - Entries have a person holding their horse on the other end of the arena. All at once they run across the arena, get their horse from the holder and lead the back across the arena to where they started, then ride the horse back to cross the line.

Sack Race - Sacks are lined up across the arena. All at once riders ride to the sack, dismount and get into the sack and hop to the finish line leading their horse.

Musical Chairs – Riders ride on the outside of a circle of tires until the music stops. Riders get off their horse and stand in the tire. The rider who does not get a tire is eliminated. Riders can only move forwards around the circle, they cannot backtrack to a tire or back up. Riders cannot cut through the middle on the inside of the tires. The final two race for their own tire side by side.

Ribbon Race - Two riders hold a ribbon between them and race side by side to the far side of the arena around a barrel and back without dropping or tearing the ribbon. Horses can go once, riders can go twice. Enter under one number.
